With a corporate vision to be 'The Energy of India' and become 'A Globally Admired Company', IndianOil has been meeting India's energy demands for over five decades. As India's flagship national oil company, IndianOil has business interests spanning across the Hydrocarbon chain which includes refining, pipeline transportation and marketing of petroleum products to Exploration & Production of crude oil and gas, and marketing of natural gas and petrochemicals.

IndianOil's Sustainability & CSR vision is to operate its activities in providing energy solutions to its customers in a manner that is efficient, safe & ethical, which minimizes negative impact on environment and enhances quality of life of the community, towards sustaining a holistic business. At IndianOil, CSR has been the cornerstone of success right from its inception in 1964. IndianOil CSR Budget is earmarked for high-priority areas such as safe drinking water, healthcare and sanitation, empowering women and socially and economically backward groups, education and employment-enhancing vocational skills, environment sustainability, protection of national heritage and promotion of art and culture, rural development, preferably in the vicinity of its major installations / establishments for improving quality of life of the community, which include marginalized groups such as SCs, STs, etc. Brief details of a few major CSR and sustainability projects are given below:

IndianOils Academic Scholarships Scheme

IndianOil Academic Scholarships (Rs. 1000-3000/month) are awarded to 2600 poor and deserving students, pursuing full-time courses in 10+/ITI, Engineering, Medical and Business Administration on merit-cum-means basis. 49.5% scholarships are reserved for SC/ST/OBC students. In each category/sub-category, 25% scholarships are reserved for girl students and 10% for persons with disabilities (PWD). The popularity of the scheme may be gauged from the fact that in the year 2014-15, more than 53,000 applications were received. During the last three years, 7800 poor students have benefitted from this scheme.

Assam Oil School of Nursing/ Assam Oil College of Nursing

Assam Oil School of Nursing (AOSN), Digboi, was established on 4th June, 1986 with the objective of providing professional training to unemployed girls in the field of nursing and midwifery. AOSN is recognized by the Indian Nursing Council (INC), a statutory body under the Government of India, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare. INC was constituted by the Central Government to establish a uniform standard of training for nurses, midwives and health workers.

AOSN offers Diploma in General Nursing and Midwifery (GNM) course to young girls (after 10+2) who wish to be professionals in the field of nursing services. 20 girls are selected on merit every year through a written test. After completion of the diploma, the students are attached to IndianOil's AOD Hospital for 12 months for internship. Students also attend different health programmes, viz. pulse polio programme, village medical health programme, mass education programme through health talk in outpatient department of the hospital, etc. Since inception, 354 students have successfully completed the course with 100% placement record. For this project, IndianOil won the 2nd prize under the category PRSI National Award (CSR) instituted by the Public Relations Society of India (PRSI) (Sep-2012). This project also got the top award under 'Women's Empowerment' category at Odisha CSR Conclave held at Bhubaneswar (Jan-2014) and at World CSR Congress, Mumbai (Feb-2014). Assam College of Nursing started functioning in Nov-2014 with intake of 30 students in B.Sc. (Nursing) course.

Fuel Station Solarisation

IndianOil has been promoting solar energy in its office buildings and fuel stations to reduce dependence on fossil fuels by utilizing the abundantly available solar energy potential. These systems have proved to be economical as well

as a desirable substitute to the existing diesel gen-sets, apart from reducing emission. Till 30 March 2015, 2663 IndianOil fuel stations have installed decentralized solar systems, with an installed capacity of 8.6 Megawatt to meet part of their power requirements.

IndianOil's fuel station, Lotus Xangpo Memorial Filling Station at Leh, became the world's highest altitude fuel station to be powered by solar power system. IndianOil already has two other solar-powered fuel stations operating at Chuglamsar and Leh-Manali Road in Ladakh region. These outlets face extreme weather conditions e.g. -25°C during winters and thin oxygen density, yet the solar systems have been functioning smoothly as the region gets bright sunlight due to dry weather conditions in most part of the year.

Assam Oil Division Hospital, Digboi, Assam

IndianOil's Assam Oil Division Hospital in Digboi (established in 1906) has 200 beds and is equipped with modern medical facilities. It caters to a population of 2 lakhs, with catchment area extending to neighbouring Arunachal Pradesh and other nearby areas of the North East. It provides medical facilities to the community at large, besides employees and dependents of IndianOil and Oil India Ltd. The hospital is recognized by the Medical Council of India for compulsory rotating internship and resident housemanship, by National Board of Examinations for Diplomas of National Board in Medicine and by the Govt. of Assam for Radiographer and Laboratory Technician training. IndianOil (AOD) hospital has advanced medical facilities and offers specialized care at nominal rates. This multi-specialty tertiary care hospital provides outpatient (OPD) services, inpatient services, 24-hours emergency, has well-equipped

operation theatres, a burn unit, diagnostic services, telemedicine centre, substance abuse treatment centre, blood bank, medical stores, morgue, dispensary, etc.

Rainwater Harvesting

To reduce freshwater consumption, IndianOil has undertaken many initiatives to improve water use efficiency in buildings and water reuse and recycling at its operating plants. As on 30th April, 2015 IOCL has installed 437 rain water harvesting structures across the country. The estimated quantity of water harvested annually is 25 lakh cubic meters, which is either used by its own plants, thereby reducing dependence on surface/groundwater, or is used to recharge the groundwater, improving source security.
