OUR PROGRAMS - MAKING A DIFFERENCE



SEWA is a program that reaches out to people affected by disasters and are in need of urgent medical support. The program focuses on structuring an organized response to an event in a time sensitive manner addressing a critical need.

In addition the program supports on-going medical facilities to communities through charitable OPD dispensaries and health camps.

The program aims to collaborate with like-minded organizations and volunteers in providing assistance to people in vulnerable situations or from an economically disadvantaged segment of society.



AANCHAL focuses on the health and well-being of the Mother and Child.

Aligning itself with the 1000-day campaign the program seeks to focus on ensuring a healthier start in a child's life specifically for children from economically marginalized groups.

To drive a deeper impact AANCHAL has identified target intervention areas under its UMEED initiative for facilitating surgeries for children with Congenital Heart Defects and those with Cleft Lip and Cleft Palate deformities.



SAVERA focuses on providing access to preventive and remedial healthcare information to a range of stakeholders through different channels of communication – children's books, audio-visuals, posters, and social media.

It seeks to provide a platform to share research, findings and trends to create awareness on critical health issues and works to drive opinion towards viable options. A focus of SAVERA is creating a credible knowledge repository of disease related information that can be accessed and used by all.

Muskaan is 9 years old. She lives with her parents and sister in Bihar. In 2014 her parents found out she had a heart problem and took her to several doctors in Patna. They all advised a surgery but due to her families financial situation she was kept on medication. After a few months her parents realized the hole in her heart had grown bigger.

Her uncle, Sanjeev, runs a tea stall outside the Fortis Support office in Gurgaon.

He found out that Fortis Foundation supports surgeries of children with Congenital Heart Defect. He sent Muskaan's reports to Fortis Foundation for assessment and on 25th November 2015 she was successfully treated.



SEWA has provided medical aid to over 24,500 people affected by disasters.

In the past year the SEWA volunteers reached out to over 3800 people affected by the Chennai Floods in December and distributed 1.5 tons of medical relief material.

In May 2015, SEWA provided medical aid to over 5000 people affected by the earthquake in Nepal.

Lakshya is 2 years old and suffers from a rare deformity called 'Nager Syndrome' which affects his face, hands and arms. Due to this condition Lakshya's speech is affected and he cannot talk. He has no control over his tongue muscles and is in constant danger of choking. He has to be supervised throughout the day and at night his parents take turns to stay awake with him.

Fortis Foundation is supporting Lakshya's treatment and he had his first surgery in January 2016. His treatment will continue for a few months.
